AIDS Walk Oklahoma

On October 16th, the Third Annual AIDS Walk Oklahoma was held in Oklahoma City at the Myriad Gardens. A major program to raise funds and awareness of HIV/AIDS, the walk is designed to provide support for twelve different organizations, including the OHF, which provide direct support for persons living with AIDS and their families. The event, which drew circa 1000 persons from all walks of life, raised nearly \$50,000 for AIDS care. Each of the participating groups will receive a share of these funds, amount-

ing to about \$2800 after expenses; people from each group were represented at the walk.

Registration began at 1 p.m., with the crowd filing by the OHF booth, manned by our college interns, and picking up our brochures on bleeding disorders and HIV. After everyone's pledges were turned in, the opening ceremonies began at 2 o'clock. Following being welcomed by Cindy Wall-Morrison from KOCO Channel 5 in Oklahoma City, our own Dorecia Tepe was the next featured speaker, giving a moving speech about her son Philip's battle with AIDS, which he lost earlier this year. She was followed by Thom Collins, who spoke inspirationally about his fight with AIDS. After Walk Director Larry Lessmann's thank yous and Cindy's closing remarks, there was a moment of silence, followed by a beautiful, ten-minute Native American blessing, performed by the Native American War Dance Guild and the Prairie Sky Singers.

Then our OHF group hit the downtown streets for the 5K trek. Under cloudy but dry skies, with mild temperatures, our group marched the route in about an hour, and returned to the Gardens to learn the winners of the raffle. And our own Debbie Klein was one of them, winning two passes to a play. Our thanks go out to our walkers, their sponsors, and the corporate contributors to this year's Walk, who are

listed along with pictures from the day on the next page.



I thought I would share the recipes for two of the dishes we'll be having at the Christmas party. If you don't want to make these yourself, please come and taste them at the party!

Apple Slice

Crust: 2 1/2 cups flour 1 teaspoon salt 1 egg yolk 1 egg white 1 tablespoon sugar 1 cup shortening 1/2 cup milk (more or less)

Sift dry ingredients together. Cut in shortening. Put yolk in 2/3 cup measuring cup and beat slightly; add enough milk to fill cup. Add to flour mixture and stir into a soft dough. Halve the dough and roll out to fit cookie sheet.

Filling:

5 cups apple slices
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 1/4 cup sugar
1 cup corn flakes

Spread flakes over bottom of crust. Spread apples over flakes. Sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. Roll other half of crust, place over the apples and seal the edges. Beat egg whites and brush on the crust. Bake at 400° for 40 minutes. While hot, glaze with Glaze:


1 cup powdered sugar 2 tablespoons lemon juice



8-10 baked potatoes
1 (16 oz.) sour cream
1 cup margarine or butter
1 small bunch green onions
1 (8 oz.) shredded cheese
salt and pepper to taste

Peel and shred baked potatoes. Sauté chopped green onions in butter. Combine all ingredients and bake at 350° for 30 minutes or until cheese is melted.

Alcohol and Nosebleeds

Because alcohol has a number of effects that interfere with hemostasis, it could be expected to cause an increase in bleeding problems. Alcohol is known to interfere with platelet function; it is also associated with a higher incidence of hypertension.

NSAID use may lead to Antihypertensive Therapy

There is possibly an association between elevated blood pressure and taking over-the-counter medications like Advil, Motrin, etc. Findings are consistent with the understanding of the pathophysiologic effects of these NSAIDs (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs), and support the practice of tapering these drugs in patients with borderline hypertension.

Support of Pneumococcal Revaccination at six years

Small study provides immunologic evidence to support recent recommendations for revaccination with pneumococcal vaccine after six years in people with high-risk chronic conditions. People at high risk of this type of pneumonia are asplenic (no spleen), those with sickle cell disease, and the HIV-positive.
